GOVERNORS' CORNER

Academy status rings the changes

The future holds many changes and challenges for staff and pupils at LMPS


As you know, Lytchett Matravers Primary School is considering a major change to its educational and financial structure by converting to academy status with the Hamwic Trust. While details are still being finalised and have to be approved by the Governing Body, the intention is to sign a new lease for the school with the Hamwic Trust for 125 years, starting November 1st, 2018.

This is a long-term initiative for the school. Academy status is intended to bring greater financial

stability and allow the school's management to plan further forward than today. Currently we fund very much from year to year and, while the school has successfully run within budget year on year, it has often been uncertain. Each year we are required to budget not just for the next year, but also produce 3-year and 5-year projections. These projections always show the school operating at a significant loss. In practice, the school's management team must carefully plan each item of costs and ensure such projected losses do not materialise.

The annual budget for the year April 2018 to March 2019 has been set with Dorset County Council as usual. However, following the change to academy status with the Hamwic Trust, this will also mean we will be setting a revised budget. This will start on November 1st, 2018 and run through to August 31st, 2019. From that point forward, the budget year will match the school year.

Around 80% of the school's costs are teaching and support



staffing costs and this will be maintained under academy status. However, many ancillary services will in future be provided by the Hamwic Trust, instead of from Dorset County Council.


The sharing of services is a key feature of the change in status. The Upton schools are also planning a similar change and also intend to join the Hamwic Trust. This will allow the group of schools in the Trust to share educational best practices, provide opportunities for bulk contracts and purchases for all the schools. The school management team will expand on these opportunities as the plan details are finalised.

The school will continue to be the village school and moving to academy status will cement the school in the fabric of the village for many years to come.







Emotion Coaching



As a school we have been very fortunate to be offered training and support from an Educational Psychologist for a pilot scheme titled 'Emotion Coaching.'

What is Emotion Coaching?

Emotion Coaching is based on the principle that nurturing and emotionally supportive relationships provide optimal contexts for the promotion of children's outcomes and resilience.

How does Emotion Coaching work?

Emotion Coaching uses moments of heightened emotion and resulting behaviour to guide and teach the child and young person about more effective responses. Through empathetic engagement, the child's emotional state is verbally acknowledged and validated, promoting a sense of security and feeling 'felt'. This activates changes in the child's neurological system and allows the child to calm down, physiologically and psychologically.

We are very much looking forward to sharing more details of the project with you once our training is underway. In the meantime if you are interested in finding out more about **Emotion Coaching** please visit their website www.emotioncoachinguk.com

A big congratulations to all Year 4 pupils who recently attended Leeson House on their first residential visit.

The children were all amazing!

On Monday 8th October, everyone arrived with their bags, big smiles and nervous Mummies and Daddies in tow. As always there was a real air of anticipation as the children boarded the coach, turned to wave at the adults they were leaving behind and began their adventure.

Our first activities at Leeson House involved a round of **Team Building** activities. It was very refreshing to notice how the children encouraged each other to tackle these tricky tasks together. There were some great conversations, team hugs and all round support seen by our staff. Working together, all teams found that they could be successful. These are skills that go way beyond the grounds of Leeson House and are the seed for some very important Life Skills.



It was great to see how well the children worked in new surroundings, all of them were keen and enthusiastic to become involved in the activities. The children were eagerly anticipating the news of who was sharing rooms, I am certain that no-one was disappointed! Let me assure you, all of them were very eager to make their own beds!



Our first day was rounded off by a night walk. The children listened attentively to the Leeson House staff, as they taught us about the constellations. The children settled well in their new bedrooms and without too much persuasion, snuggled down to a good night's sleep. It is always very satisfying for the staff involved, to see children, who may have been a little apprehensive before their visit, achieve this goal. We were very fortunate this year to be able to celebrate two birthdays during our stay with the usual birthday cakes, candles and singing!

The second day of our visit involved a walk along the Priests Way and coastal path, this gave the children a great

opportunity to enjoy the spectacular landscapes that surround us here in Dorset and to learn about our local history and folk-law. Under crystal clear blue skies with beautifully warm sunshine, we were able to enjoy the wonders of the coastline at it's very best.

The Leeson House staff are great at capturing the children's imaginations with tales of smugglers and ship-wrecks. I am certain that most children were spurred on to complete their walk in record - time by Mr France keeping a watchful eye at the rear of the group! Our return to Leeson House revealed some rather tired children, however they were all happy to spend their money in the gift shop! (As always, the time taken to settle down to sleep on night two was far less than night one.)

I feel very strongly that residential trips such as this one provide our pupils with the very best broad and balanced education that is sometimes difficult to achieve in the constraints of the classroom.

Before the laws were changed children as young as six were working in factories for up to twelve hours a day with little or no breaks and a pittance for wages. Young boys were sent up chimneys even when a law was passed because the cost of a chimney brush was more than the fine for using a boy.

Children who worked in mines faced daily dangers as did children who had to work on the streets for unscrupulous masters. Fortunately, brave men and women like Shaftesbury fought for the rights of children to go to school and not to have to work in terrible conditions. It was a great day of drama which helped Year 6 to appreciate their rights to be safe and to receive an education!

Victorian Drama Day!

On Monday, 8th October LMPS was invaded by chimney sweeps, house maids, beggar children, rich ladies dressed in silk and flat-capped cheeky lads as the hall was transformed into a Victorian school room, coal mine, factory, mill, hospital and the estate of Lord Shaftesbury.

The Tree House Theatre Company brilliantly involved all of Year 6 and their teachers in re-creating life for children during the Victorian Times. During the morning, the classes were divided into

four groups and each group learnt their lines and practised their roles. After lunch, the classes came together and performed a drama which made the audience laugh, gasp and brought some tears to a few eyes.

The central theme of the drama was to show how reformers such as Lord Shaftesbury and Dr Barnado worked to change the laws in Great Britain which allowed children to work in terrible jobs in unsafe conditions.

To make an application for Free School Meals (FSM), please ring 01305 251000.


You will be asked your name, date of birth, national insurance number and your child's name, date of birth and address.

£100 Allowance

Any child that is entitled to free school meals via pupil premium, (i.e. in receipt of free meals because you are in receipt of benefits), can now claim £100 per school year to use towards costs related to their child's education. This funding can be

used for items such as school uniform and educational school trips/experiences like swimming for example. In order for you to claim part or all of your £100 allowance, please speak to the school office, or contact Mr France or Mrs Dominey.
