Something to look out for in the new year is our '*Maths for Parents*' session.





## SusTrans Visit



On Thursday 22nd November, SusTrans (a nationwide charity) came to Lytchett Matravers Primary School to work with the Year 5 children. SusTrans visited the school in order to view Wareham Road outside our school, because this road is need of a lot of attention.

First of all, we all went in Buzzard classroom and talked about why some streets and roads are good, and others are not so good. We then looked further into what makes these streets good or bad. When sent back to our classrooms, we were split into groups and given printed images along with some post-it notes, which we were asked to write good and bad things about these images and how the streets make us feel.

Then, we thought about how different people may use the street and the particular needs they may have. People such as parents, elderly people, children and disabled people in wheelchairs. What makes streets good and bad for these people? Before the bell went for break,

we talked about how barriers can block ramps and drop curbs which can cause traffic jams and cause problems for disabled people.

After break, Osprev class went out onto Wareham Road to observe the traffic and look at the road itself. In our groups, we were given a sheet to make notes of thing that were good, things that were bad and things that we would like to see placed on Wareham Road. In our group, we said that we would like to see another zebra crossing, a lollipop lady and a cycle lane on the side of the road.

When we came in from the road, we were given a large A1 map where we could draw what we would like to see on the road in the future. This gave our group the opportunity to draw on the many things we wanted to see. Once we had finished, the maps were given to SusTrans to view and help decide what we're going to do to improve Wareham Road.

After school the same day, SusTrans went outside the school to speak to parents about what they thought could be improved. This was all helping SusTrans decide what they're going to do to improve the road. All in all, it was a great afternoon that was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone. We can't wait till next January when they'll be coming back!

promotion of children's outcomes and resilience.

Through recent research it has been shown that **Emotion Coached** children and young people:

- Achieve more academically in school
- Are more popular
- Have fewer behavioural problems
- Have fewer infectious illnesses
- Are more emotionally stable
- Are more resilient

We have been very fortunate to be offered training and support from an Educational Psychologist for a pilot scheme titled 'Emotion Coaching.'

What is Emotion Coaching? Emotion Coaching is based on the principle that nurturing and emotionally supportive relationships provide optimal contexts for the

**Emotion Coaching** uses moments of heightened emotion and resulting behaviour to guide and teach the child and young person about more effective responses. Through empathetic engagement, the child's emotional state is verbally acknowledged and validated, promoting a sense of security and feeling 'felt'. This activates changes in the child's neurological system and allows the child to calm down, physiologically and psychologically.

Throughout this academic year the training is going to be offered to all staff to enable them to consider how they approach and deal with the behaviours of individuals. The training will be delivered by Clare Anderson, an *Educational* Psychologist working for Dorset County Council. She has worked for over 10 years with children with attachment difficulties, Looked after and adopted children and in residential care homes.

This year we have a real focus on improving children's physical development, which comprises of two main areas - Moving & Handling and Self & Health Care.

Since the children have started here at LMPS, we have been really encouraging the children to develop their Self & Health Care skills in a number of different ways.

One of the most recent has been the encouragement of the children cutting their own food when eating their hot school meals. The children have loved 'having a go' and using a knife and fork to cut up their food independently. By doing this the children have gained a sense of selfconfidence and have, in turn, also been developing their hand strength and their hand to eye coordination.

Whilst this may seem like a basic activity to focus on - it is essential for the children to build strength in their hands and develop other physical development skills in order to be able to hold a pencil and write down words and numbers.

Another activity, which we have been practising, is encouraging the children to be able to dress and undress themselves independently. The children have been making us so proud by managing to now take on and off most items of clothing - with just a little help sometimes needed with buttons and laces!

We will be continuing to focus on the development of the children's Physical Development throughout the year and would like to ask for your support in this by encouraging the children to dress themselves independently at home and practise cutting their food. They gain a real sense of achievement and we love seeing their faces when they can do it!


### Oh No It Isn't!




